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		<ul> <li>(b) After deliberation, CWRB concurred that the proposed "aluminium formworker" does not meet the CWRO requirements to add a new trade division for the following reasons:</li> <li>The legislative intent of the CWRO is to regulate trade divisions with considerable skill levels. Technically, the erection of the aluminium formwork is similar to only partial skills of a formworker. The main processing procedure of the aluminium formwork is erection and skill requirements of erection are not high. It is not compatible with the legislative intent to add a new trade division;</li> <li>Carpenters (Formwork) generally have the skills of erecting aluminium formwork. At present, those work steps of aluminium formwork requires physical strength are generally performed by general workers. Those work steps require more skills are carried out by Carpenters (Formwork). The work of the aluminium formwork can be carried out by registered construction workers including registered general workers under the current CWRO;</li> <li>At present, mixed formworks or plastic formwork are used in the market. It would be frustrating to site operation if trade divisions are determined by materials used;</li> <li>The CWRO regulates technical requirements rather than safety. The most effective way to raise safety awareness of workers is to strengthen training;</li> <li>The major trend of construction industry development should be taken into account in order to determine any amendments for the legislation, for example, the use of Modular Integrated Construction and Design for Manufacture and Assembly.</li> <li>(c) A total of 923 workers completed and passed specified training courses from January to September 2019.</li> </ul>

The Scheme comprises three awards, namely Continuing Professional Development Award, Career Progression Award and Multiple Skills Award. Prizes are offered to attract workers to participate in the Scheme.	
		(c) The Sub-committee explored ways of promoting worker welfare facilities on construction sites. A preliminary plan of setting up "showcase for outstanding welfare facilities" on the Council website was devised to introduce the best practice on sites and tips of worker welfare facilities.

		(b) Council agreed in principle to publish the dashboard on the Council website at its 005/19 meeting. CWRB agreed to Sub-committee's final review on dashboard and agreed to publish the dashboard in November 2019.
