Chapter 2 – Proposed Terms of Reference of the Construction Industry Council

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- Prior to the establishment of CIC, construction industry reforms were spearheaded by the Provisional Construction Industry Co-ordination Board (PCICB), whose terms of reference are as follows -
 - (a) To deliberate and generate consensus among different sectors of the construction industry on strategic issues affecting the industry, such as <u>construction technology</u>, research and standardisation, <u>and human resources development</u>;
 - (b) To consider and <u>take forward those recommendations of the</u> <u>Construction Industry Review Committee</u> which require coordination or input by the industry co-ordinating body, including setting priority and timeframe;

- (c) To <u>maintain close contact and exchange views with Government</u> on all construction-related matters;
- (d) To enhance <u>self-regulatory functions</u> for the construction industry through the <u>formulation of codes of conduct</u>;
- (e) To promote <u>sharing of knowledge</u> in industry good practices, innovative construction technologies and sound management techniques;
- (f) To <u>devise performance indicators</u> for the construction industry to measure its improvements;
- (g) To advise Government on the <u>formation and future development of</u> <u>the industry co-ordinating body</u>; and
- (h) To <u>report regularly to the Secretary for the Environment, Transport</u> <u>and Works</u> on the work progress of the Provisional Construction Industry Co-ordination Board.

• The terms of reference of CIC is drawn up taking these into account and incorporated into the CIC Ordinance as the "Functions of the Council".

Chapter 2 – Terms and Reference of the Construction Industry Council

• CIC's scope of work as set out in S5 of the CIC Ordinance is more extensive and specific in nature -

"5. Functions of Council

The functions of the Council are—

(a) to advise and make <u>recommendations to the Government</u> on strategic matters, major policies and legislative proposals, that may affect or are connected with the construction industry, and on matters of concern to the construction industry;

(b) to <u>reflect</u> to the Government the construction industry's needs and <u>aspirations</u>;"

- (c) to <u>elevate the quality and competitiveness</u> of the construction industry by promoting the ongoing development and improvement of the industry;
- (d) to uphold professionalism and integrity within the construction industry by promoting <u>self-regulation</u>, formulating codes of conduct and enforcing such codes;
- (e) to improve the performance of persons connected with the construction industry through establishing or administering registration schemes or rating schemes;

(f) to advance the skills of personnel in the construction industry through planning, promotion, supervision, provision or coordination of <u>training</u> courses or programmes;

(g) to encourage <u>research</u> activities and the use of innovative techniques and to establish or promote the establishment of <u>standards</u> for the construction industry;

 (h) to promote <u>good practices</u> in the construction industry in relation to dispute resolution, environmental protection, multi-layer subcontracting, occupational safety and health, procurement methods, project management and supervision, sustainable construction and other areas conducive to improving construction quality; (i) to enhance the cohesiveness of the construction industry by promoting <u>harmonious labour relations</u> and the observance of statutory requirements relating to employment, and by facilitating communication among various sectors of the industry;

(j) to serve as a <u>resource centre</u> for the sharing of knowledge and experience within the construction industry;

(k) to assess improvements made by the construction industry through the compilation of <u>performance indicators</u>;

(l) to make recommendations with respect to the rate of the <u>*levy*</u> *imposed under this Ordinance; and*

(m) to perform any <u>other functions relevant to the construction</u> <u>industry</u>, including those functions conferred or imposed on it by or under this Ordinance or any other enactment.

- Moreover, due to the anticipated amalgamation of CIC and the Construction Industry Training Authority (CITA), the Council's scope of work will cover training and trade testing matters* –
 - **"6. Supplementary functions of Council** Without limiting section 5, the Council also has the following functions—
 - (a) to provide training courses for the construction industry;
 - (b) to <u>establish and maintain industrial training centres</u> for the construction industry;

^{*} CIC may also function as the Registrar of Construction Workers if appointed under the Construction Workers Registration Ordinance.

- *(c) to <u>assist, including by the provision of financial assistance, in</u> <i>the placement of persons who have completed training courses provided for the construction industry;*
- (d) to <u>assess the standards of skills</u> achieved by any person in any kind of work involving or in connection with the construction industry, to <u>conduct examinations and tests</u>, to issue or award <u>certificates of attendance or competence</u>, and to <u>establish the</u> <u>standards</u> to be achieved in respect of any such work;
- (e) where it is appointed under the Construction Workers Registration Ordinance (18 of 2004) as the <u>Registrar of</u> <u>Construction Workers</u> under that Ordinance, to perform the functions conferred or imposed on the Registrar by or under that Ordinance or any other enactment."
